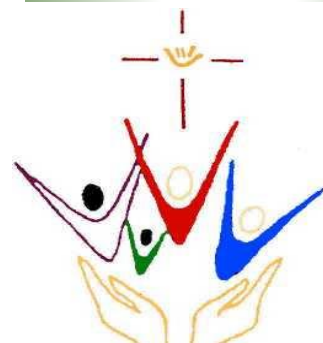

The Pandemic may have stopped Cursillo Weekends, but it didn't stop Living Cursillo (i.e., 4th Day). So, because I always say "Yes" to Cursillo, when I was asked to write a brief article about ***"what I'm doing in my 4th day to bring the Good News to my environments"***, this is it!

It's hard to believe that two years ago, I didn't know what Zoom was, and now, so much of my life is on this miracle of communication! My parish never had virtual Masses, so early on in Covid times, I began to tune into St. Teresa of Avila for Sunday morning Mass. When I told my son John about this, he saw his opportunity because, at the time he couldn't attend his Church- Nossa Senhora da Paz- in Rio de Janeiro. So, ever since then, John and I have been attending Mass at STA together- though 5,000 miles apart- and having coffee every Sunday after Mass. This makes for a long moment close to Christ every Sunday!

Zoom meetings have also been regular occurrences for my family and my extended family... lots of fun, exchanges of information, and even playing games!

My **"Action"** has evolved to accommodate the conditions of social distancing:

- My Spiritual Direction ministry has grown during these last two years- the need seems to be greater. So, I am privileged to serve as such a companion on the journey for a few/ several people each week, all on Zoom. I see my own spiritual director the same way.
- I am part of a group at Riderwood (the Continuing Care Retirement Community where I live) committed to being an advocate with our state legislature for gun violence prevention. This is done by email and phone calls.

- With a group of Catholics at Riderwood, I am working to encourage conversation about being a synodal Church.

Prayer and Study have also flourished with Zoom in Retreats, Days of Reflection, Bible Study, Anti-Racism, and Catholic Social Teaching!

I couldn't keep up my enthusiasm for all of this **Prayer, Study and Action** without the support/friendship of the three group reunions I'm a part of. We have continued to meet (mostly on Zoom). One group meets faithfully every week, the other two meet once a month or so.

I have continued to delight in meeting with the **Laurel Ultreya** every month and (again on Zoom, no driving, commuting time, or getting lost). I've even been blessed to join in sharing with a few other Ultreyas.

God is so good to have provided all these opportunities to share in His life and to share in my life as a Cursillista! De Colores!

The Many Colors of the Fourth Day

What do you say when someone asks you to explain Cursillo?

I've been confronted with that problem as I represent Cursillo at the Diocesan Association of Ecclesial Movement and New Communities (AEMNC). The other members represent a diversity of groups each of which has a shared ministry. Cursillo isn't like that. Each of us, Cursillistas, has a personal ministry to evangelize our own environments. But then, how is that different from the Baptismal commitment everyone receives? After forty-five years in Cursillo, I am beginning to understand why the start of our work is to make a friend. In friendship, we can begin to explain how we reinforce the growth of the individual person in the presence of friends who both support us and call us to be accountable for growing in our faith and spreading the Good News in our environments. Support and accountability with friends who are willing to share our journeys. **That's the hallmark of our 4th Day.**

But sometimes the Fourth Day takes a right turn. I had the opportunity to understand the impact of Cursillo at our last AEMNC meeting. It was the evening of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday and a number of members were traveling home from weekend visits; thus, with fewer members we had time to share more of our journeys.

Kim Viet Ngo, the representative of the Vietnamese Cursillo movement told us of her arrival as a boat person and refugee from Vietnam with the sole purpose of becoming an American and supporting her relatives. She told us that she had been swept up by the American culture of materialism and while she was remarkably successful in her career, she felt she was missing something. A friend brought her to Cursillo, and she discovered her best and truest self.

Then came the great surprise. There were eleven of us there and one by one those present began to tell us about their faith journeys.

Kindling the Fire



The leader of this organization for the archdiocese had made Cursillo in Pennsylvania, moved to DC, and didn't get connected to Cursillo, but founded Houses of Adoration in this diocese. The members are dedicated to the living Person of Christ in the Eucharist and work as Eucharistic Ministers, adorers of the Blessed Sacrament, promoters of Adoration and visitation of the sick and those in need of comfort and prayers.

Her deputy is a leader in Couples for Christ, a movement founded in 1981 to build and support the church of the home, evangelizing families as part of a global community in 120 countries. As he continued to talk about his journey, he mentioned that one of the life experiences that pointed him toward Christ was an Echo retreat. Echo retreats were developed like Cursillo and designed especially for young people in high school.

The diocesan leaders of Worldwide Marriage Encounter talked about their missionary work among the Native Americans in New Mexico and Arizona. They had made Cursillo before their departure on mission and returned to this area to be grandparents and to serve as the leaders of Worldwide Marriage Encounter.

The Families in Christ Jesus Community came to our archdiocese from the Philippines and are dedicated to bringing families together in prayer group community whose priority is to develop loving and caring relationships.

They provide Christian formation, symposia, retreats, and a wide variety of Christian formation programs to foster the development of the family, the domestic church. The leaders made Cursillo in the Philippines.

Finally, we heard of the journey of the representative from the Mother of God charismatic community. The son and grandson of Presbyterian ministers, whose father eventually joined the Episcopal church because he wanted a more formal liturgy, had declared as a high schooler in a Catholic school that he was not interested in being a Catholic. He said that, also, as a college student – before he made a Cursillo. He is now a Catholic as is his brother who is also a priest.

In case you didn't count, seven (when you count me) of the eleven people present had made Cursillo or Echo retreats. Each of them is a leader in a different movement, but the characteristic of each of those movements is the formation of base communities. The Holy Spirit gave them the experience of Cursillo and in what we consider as their Fourth Day, each of the Catholic leaders took a right turn, becoming a leader in his or her own right.

Cursillo give many gifts and to many of us that is the gift of the method and the resultant enduring friendship of committed Catholics who walk with us, support us, and make us accountable for our continued growth and outreach. To others, the gift is a springboard to a different type of ministry and Fourth Day.

Do you know someone who needs a springboard into a richer life? Make a friend.

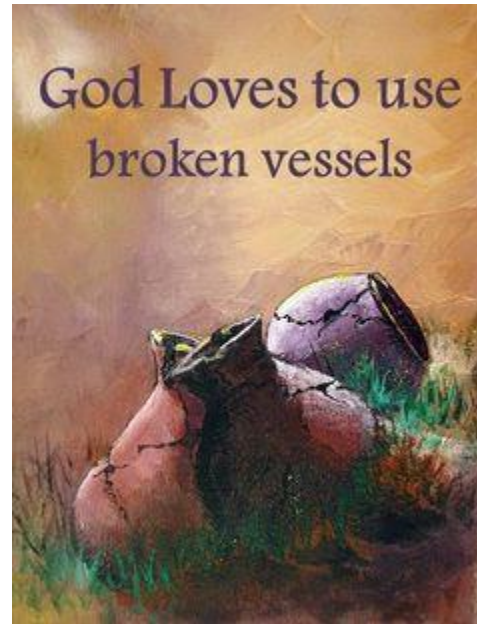

An Offering for Our 4th Day

For many years, I was content going through routine stuff with regard to my faith, in general, and my religion, in particular. I was aware that I had faith in a ***Living and Loving God***, but my faith was passive, not alive and active. Having attended Catholic schools all my life, I learned the traditional prayers and practiced the usual customs at school. Days began with morning prayers, then classes, recess then back to classes until the midday lunch break, more prayers before resuming the afternoon classes, and finally closing prayers at the end of the day. We observed special feast days by attending Mass and held special devotions such as during Lent. Later, in high school, under the tutelage of the sisters, once again morning prayers at assembly, praying the Rosary every day during Lent, having silent retreat days devoted to prayer, reading the lives of various Saints and visitations to the chapel on school premises. We were encouraged to join organizations such as the Legion of Mary and to perform the corporal and spiritual works of Mercy, sharing our works at the meetings. In my high school from May to October of each year on the 13th of the month, we were accompanied by the nuns on a pilgrimage to Our Lady of Fatima, walking approximately four miles to the Statue of Our Lady and shrine located on the Laventille hill. These and many other experiences provided a measure of living and growing in my faith.

Fast forward many years later after graduation from a Catholic college in California, I returned home to Trinidad and was invited by a friend to experience a Life in the Spirit seminar. I believe that this was the start of a new journey of faith for me as I experienced the joy of the Holy Spirit embracing me, claiming me, and pointing me to rediscover Christ.



I returned to the US many years later becoming a parishioner at St. Nicholas Church. I experienced a barrenness in my spirit, an "unbelonging" is the best way I can describe it. I needed to rediscover the Christ who dwelt in me, the Christ who touched my soul and embraced me lovingly during my experience of the Life in the Spirit. And so it happened that I was invited by my sponsor Ginny Novak to a Cursillo weekend, and I prayerfully attended. Thanks be to God that I accepted that invitation and experienced Christ in a way I never had before. I believe that was a life changing moment for me as I have moved from passively observing my faith to being an active participant in God's work. I served as Ultreya leader at St. Nicholas, have given witness to His Love and transformation in my life and have used the gifts of the Holy Spirit as a member of the St. Nicholas Prayer Warriors, supporting our brothers and sisters in prayer through various challenges. I believe that the Cursillo mission of bringing others to Christ is alive in me as I share His Love with co-workers, family members and friends. **De Colores!**

We Are Companions On A Journey

It all started at Ultreya one Saturday evening at Brother Richard's house. Jack Sherman gave the witness talk that evening. It was a powerful witness about how he and some fellow parishioners at St. John the Baptist parish became Stephen Ministers. A Stephen Minister, Jack explained, entered a training program in which each volunteer learned to walk with those who were experiencing crises in their lives. The nature of the crisis was less important than the need of that person at that moment for a faithful, confidential caregiver who could provide both emotional and spiritual companionship.

Jack's talk was for me a gift from the Holy Spirit answering a yearning deep within me to take the experience gained in a long career in social work and a lifetime of caregiving within my own family and develop it into building a community and a community of care givers at my own parish of St. Andrew Apostle. With the support of a fellow Cursillista, Deacon Mike Bond, and the support of our new pastor, Fr. Dan Leary, Deacon Mike, and I began a program to train and supervise lay caregivers.

We begin the training with a series of instructional meetings and once the volunteer Stephen Ministers were matched with someone in need, the whole group of volunteers met occasionally to share the trials and joys they were experiencing in their new ministry.

St. Andrew's now has sixty trained Stephen Ministers who have served twice that number of individual needing care. Those receiving care were experiencing such challenges as loss of a loved one, illness, unemployment, divorce, problems in parenting, elder care, military deployment, and spiritual crises. At every turn, the Holy Spirit was there to guide us through many ministry challenges. Two new pastors have embraced Stephen Ministry, albeit after a bit of a nudge from the Holy Spirit.

We have weathered COVID with virtual meetings, changes in leadership within the program, and the illness and death of several ministers. But through all these challenges with the blessings of the Holy Spirit, we have begun to build the giving and caring Christian community we have so longed for in our parish. All of us, ministers and those receiving care, are grateful for the palpable presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives as we walk as companions on our journeys now joined in service with one another.

You never know what can happen through a graced witness at Ultreya!

In the fall of 2020, after months of no Masses, followed by sparsely attended Masses with masks and social distancing, a group of parishioners, also Cursillistas, at St. Nicholas in Laurel, inspired by a Matthew Kelly video, approached our Pastor, with ideas of how to support other parishioners in this difficult time.

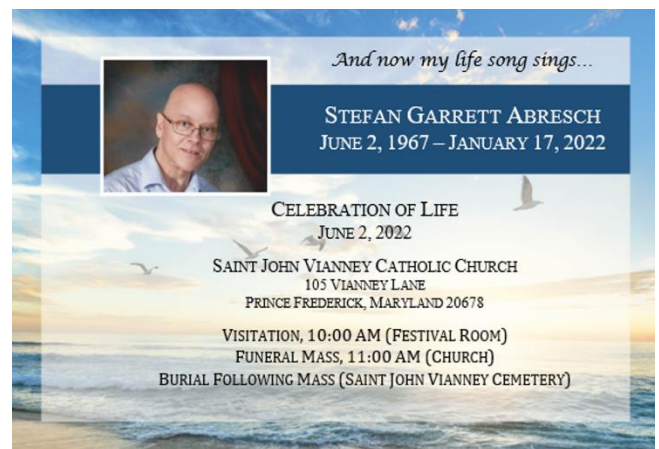
With our Pastor's approval, we decided to give out a Matthew Kelly book to everyone at Christmas (***I Heard God Laugh***). We included a letter encouraging their continued attendance at Mass, and promising a telephone call from a parishioner, to see how they were doing, to see if they needed anything, and to thank them for their continued financial support. We encouraged those who came to a Christmas Mass and got a book to take extra copies and give them to any of their friends and neighbors who were not yet attending Mass. We put together a team to make the calls (most of the callers were Cursillistas), and hand delivered the book to those who were still not coming to Mass.

We turned over the information gathered to the parish secretary to update the parish database, and the Pastor contacted those with specific needs.

Although the response to the phone calls, from those who actually picked up, was very positive, we have no way of knowing for sure what the actual impact of our efforts were. But that's okay, we saw a problem in our environment, planned, and carried it out.
